EXCEPTIONAL EDUCATION A TOP PRIORITY AS DISTRICT CUTS SPENDING

Dear Community Members.

As we begin the 2023-2024 school year, I must address a challenging issue regarding our school budget. We are facing a significant shortfall that necessitates some difficult decisions at Manson School District.

This shortfall is the result of increasing costs and economic challenges as well as unsustainable spending during the past few school years. To address this deficit, Manson will need to significantly decrease spending immediately and carefully monitor the budget for additional cuts and adjustments throughout this school year and as we plan a sustainable budget for the following year. This will be a challenging time for our school community, but I assure you I will work hard to communicate with transparency and honesty.

As we carefully analyze and project for the school year with financial experts throughout our region, our budget shortfall is currently projected to be over one million dollars without reductions in spending. I have already made cuts in spending including reducing travel, reducing extra staff time, reducing spending in all areas, and delaying some projects and spending. At the October board meeting, our school board passed a Declaration of Financial Emergency and directed me to bring a plan for reducing spending to them for their consideration. I am working collaboratively and thoughtfully to plan for reductions that will have the least impact on classroom learning for our students.

I want to reassure you that, in making these decisions, our top priority is the wellbeing of our students and the district's essential needs, including safety. We are committed to safeguarding the core educational programs and services that directly impact our students and continuing the work toward our goals and priorities while increasing academic outcomes for every student at Manson.

We understand the gravity of the situation and will keep you informed as we navigate through these challenges. Your continued support is invaluable, and together, we will overcome these obstacles while providing an exceptional education for our students.


